The return from Christmas break found everyone in that 2nd semester mindset with new goals and expectations built upon the work and achievements of the first half of the school year. Seeing the progress on the children's report cards each quarter is gratifying, and among the reasons I celebrate Catholic schools every day.

The first weeks of February brought our mid-cycle accreditation visit followed by a Professional Development In-Service that focused on differentiated instruction as well as a detailed grade level analysis of our students' responses to questions on the MEAP tests. While the test gauges the retention and application of individual skills, the data it generates helps the teachers pinpoint areas of concern in order to refine instruction, be it in terms of topic, terminology, or adopting more methods of teaching a concept. Our MEAP scores speak for themselves, yet the challenge always exists to stay dynamic and flexible to meet the educational and spiritual needs of our students.

On a personal note, I would like to convey my heartfelt thanks to all who offered prayers and condolences after the passing of my grandmother, Mary Gagliardo. Knowing I have such prayerful support gave me strength and consolation. She was a wonderful, warm, typical Italian grandmother whom I can only hope to take after, even a little bit.

PENNIES FOR PATIENTS

Physical Education with Dr. Learman

For grades K-5, we are finishing hopping, catching rolling balls, and working on the forehand strike and running form. We are continuing to work on aerobic fitness and flexibility about one day per month. Upper grades will be taking the President's Physical Fitness Test.

For catching rolling balls, your child should know and be able to demonstrate the following:

1. Ready positions (feet shoulder width apart, knees bent, and palms out fingers down)
2. Eyes on the balls
3. Catch with hand under ball, pinky fingers together
4. Pull ball to stomach

We want to slide or shuffle to the ball and not cross our feet.

K-2nd Graders are learning about best effort and various ways to cooperate. These include:

1. Taking turns
2. Sharing
3. Not bothering others
4. Listening, then doing
5. Cheering others on
6. Stopping when asked

For running form, your child should know and be able to demonstrate the following:

1. Head still, eyes looking straight
2. Run on toes
3. Slight forward lean at the waist
4. High knees and high heels
5. Thumbs up, elbows at 90 degrees, and rotate at the shoulders

To gallop, your child should know and be able to demonstrate these 4 phases with either foot leading:

1. Step
2. Push
3. Airborne
4. Close

Your child should know and be able to demonstrate the following parts of Forehand Strike:

1. The parts of the racket: the head, throat and handle
2. Proper grip (shake hands)
3. Keep the striking surface straight up and down
4. Ready position
5. Drop the ball, step and swing, and swing low to high

The computers raced to keep up with the speeding cars, and when the last of the time trial data was analyzed, the winners of the den races were announced. The Wolf den results were **Andrew H.** in first and **Luke C.** in second place, followed by **Will B.** in third.
